nstead characterized in particular by its employment of classically trained inst

ough British artists. The music, as well as 🔔 the theatrical nature of

performances associated with the genre, was able to appeal to artistically incli

ned adolescents and younger adults, 🔔 especially due to its virtuosity

and musical/lyrical complexity.[3] Art rock is most associated with a certain pe
